"How are you, Mary Jane?" asked Ben Matthews. "I'm feeling fine, Ben," said his wife, a smiling buxom woman, much thrilled by her first visit to London.

Rosy-cheeked Hilda Richards, seventeen-years-old daughter of the skipper, searched anxiously for hoe father. When he poked his head through the hatchway she made a dash for the boat.

"GOOD ENOUGH FOR ME"

Mrs Bessie Cotton, whose husband died after years of service in the mercantile marine, has brought his medals with her.

"I have been in my little house for 17 years and I don't want to lose it," she said. "It is quite big and good enough for me and my boys.

"Perhaps it does need one or two improvements, but why should it be pulled down? It is a strong house, and has survived the Cornish weather for about a hundred years."

Mrs. Cotton said a previous resident reached the age of 101, so "it can't be described as unhealthy, can it?" she asked.

Mrs. Walker, another widow, who, with her little children, lives in the same little street as Mrs. Cotton, said: "We put our savings in our house, and we don't want to lose it."
